

The Book of the Servant

The word of the LORD came to the prophet Isaiah during the reigns of Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz and Hezekiah, kings of Judah from 740-700 BC (Isaiah 1:1).

Isaiah's commission started in the year King Uzziah died (Isaiah 6:1,8).

The prophecy or vision of Isaiah is vast and covers many ideas and theological themes. It is useful to break it up into more manageable and logical portions. The simplest and most useful breakdown is to identify three main sections, namely:

- The Book of the King Isaiah 1 to 37
- The Book of the Servant Isaiah 38 to 55
- The Book of the Conqueror Isaiah 56 to 66

(Motyer, 2016, p.5-6)

The Book of the Servant is a glorious prophecy offering great hope to the people of God, holding out in a wicked world. In the Book of the Servant, the following themes are covered.

1. Comfort. A word of comfort against the backdrop of the future Babylon invasions, the deportations into exile (605 BC and 597 BC) and the destruction of Jerusalem and the temple (586 BC).
2. Good tidings or good news. Good news in Hebrew is *basar* (בִּשְׂרָה), meaning *to bear tidings*. Good news or glad tidings is found in: Isaiah 40:9 (twice); 41:27; 52:7 (twice). In Isaiah 52:7, it is called good news and good tidings alternatively. The LXX translates to bring or announce good news, or gospel as *euangelizo* (εὐαγγελίζω). In the New Testament this good news is called the gospel from *euangelion*.
3. The uniqueness of the LORD. The claim by the LORD that he alone is God, with the phrase 'there is no other' is stated seven times in Isaiah 38-55, of which five occurrences are found in Isaiah 45 alone. They are found in: Isaiah 44:8; Isaiah 45:5, 6, 14, 18, 22; and Isaiah 46:9.
4. The futility of idols and idolatry. Idolatry was plaguing the Southern Kingdom and Isaiah addresses the problem throughout the book of the Servant.

Idols: Isaiah 40:19-20; Isaiah 41:7; Isaiah 44:10, 12, 15, 17.

Idolatry: Isaiah 41:22; Isaiah 42:8, 17; Isaiah 44:9; Isaiah 45:16, 20; Isaiah 46:1 and Isaiah 48:5, 14.

Idolatry, in essence was not trusting the LORD's ability to deal with the problems of his people, i.e. faithlessness, and displacing the LORD with other gods. Idolatry was the main reason that they ended up in Babylon.

5. 'I am He', Hebrew *ani hu* (אֲנִי־הוּא). In Greek they are translated as *ego eimi* (ἐγώ εἰμι). These are called the non-predicated 'I am He' statements, only used by YAHWEH in the Old Testament, which means they have no clear object or predicate.

YAHWEH does not need to compare himself in terms of any other description, than simply and profoundly stating 'I am He'. There are seven of these statements in Isaiah 38-55. They are found in: Isaiah 41:4; Isaiah 43:10, 13, 25, Isaiah 46:4; Isaiah 48:12. Isaiah 51:12

6. The songs of the Servant. There are four aptly named Servant songs to be found in Isaiah 38-55. They occur in Isaiah 42:1-4; Isaiah 49:1-7, Isaiah 50:4-9; and Isaiah 52:13-53:12. The Servant songs describe the work and identity of the Servant of YAHWEH. They answer the following questions: Who was he? What was his relationship to YAHWEH? What was his mission? What did he accomplish? Which part of his work is still outstanding?

7. Substitutionary atonement. This is one of the great themes of Isaiah 38-55. Where the Servant of the LORD offers himself as a ransom for his people to redeem them. He becomes a penal substitution for the sins of his people and thereby achieves their redemption and justification.

8. Accomplished redemption. This is described in Isaiah 38-55 in the work of the Suffering Servant. Salvation is accomplished, but not yet completed. There is still a future aspect to develop.

9. Zion. There is an earthly city called Jerusalem in Judah, which fails to live up to YAHWEH's ideal for Zion. Then there is Zion, YAHWEH's eternal city, which is described throughout the prophecy of Isaiah. This is a place of holiness, justice and righteousness. Citizenship is gained not by nationality, but through penal substitution and redemption. These are the entry and citizenship requirements to become part of Zion.

10. Babylon. There is a rival city to Zion or Jerusalem called Babylon, which signifies the place of all rebellion, even from ancient times.

The Jews would physically become exiles in this city for seventy years, according to the prophet Jeremiah. However, there is also a spiritual Babylon, the city of rebellion and opposition against YAHWEH's rule. The spiritual exile of the Jews had to be ended as well, and they had to be delivered from this Babylon. Daniel is informed that this would take seventy times seven, or four hundred and ninety years (Daniel 9:24-26).

11. The Mission of Zion's Children. Their mission is to declare the good news of Zion and its Redeemer, and be an attraction among the nations, so that the very best and finest would become citizens of Zion.

These are some of the major themes in the Book of the Servant.

Hezekiah's Faith Strengthened**Introduction**

The Book of the Servant begins with Hezekiah's illness. This event provides the backdrop for the transition between the time of the Assyrian threat from 740 BC to 722 BC, when the Northern Kingdom fell, and the ongoing threat to the Southern Kingdom of Judah, reaching its peak in the siege of Jerusalem in 701 BC (Isaiah 1:7-9).

Assyrian power wanes until 612 BC with the fall of Nineveh, and the rise and transition to the Babylonian threat, culminating in the deportations into exile in 605 BC and 597 BC. Eventually, the city of Jerusalem is besieged, and the temple destroyed in 586 BC.

At the time of the Assyrian siege, Hezekiah became terminally ill, and the LORD sent Isaiah to inform him regarding his imminent death. Hezekiah pleaded for his life, and the LORD determined to spare him for another fifteen years.

This section can be divided according to the following themes:

The Stairway of Ahaz

It was likely a type of sundial or a series of steps used to measure time by the position of the sun's shadow. It was constructed by Hezekiah's father, King Ahaz, the previous ruler of Judah. The event was probably confined to the land of Judah, rather than a global event. This is borne out by the inquiry of Babylonian ambassadors, recorded in the book of Chronicles.

Hezekiah's Faith Falters**Introduction**

After Hezekiah was healed by the LORD of his terminal illness, some envoys from Babylon suddenly appeared to enquire after his health. Why did they come when they heard of Hezekiah's return to health and the sun going back ten steps on the dial of Ahaz?

2 Chronicles 32:31 But when envoys were sent by the rulers of Babylon to ask him about the miraculous sign that had occurred in the land, God left him to test him and to know everything that was in his heart.

How did they know about these events? When one considers the events around the Assyrian threat to Judah, and the sudden appearance of the Babylonians under the leadership of Merodach Baladan, the leader of the Babylonians, well more than 100 years before they became an Empire, we must conclude that Hezekiah had dealings with them to avert the Assyrian threat.

This explains Isaiah's rebuke of Hezekiah's actions, compared against the historical background of his father Ahaz's unbelief (Isaiah 7:3-4). When Ahaz faced a lesser threat from Ephraim (the Northern Kingdom) and Aram, he demonstrated his lack of faith by subjecting himself to Tiglath-Pileser as a vassal (2 Kings 16:7-8). This was after the LORD promised through Isaiah and said, 'Be careful, keep calm and don't be afraid. Do not lose heart because of these two smouldering stubs of firewood (Isaiah 7:4). Ahaz did not listen, and in time the Assyrians became a threat and a scourge to Judah.

Despite the LORD's assurance that Assyria would not prevail against Judah (Isaiah 37:5-7), just as the LORD had promised his father many years before, Hezekiah still made contact with the Babylonians. Hezekiah was doing the same thing as his wicked father by trusting in Babylon to deliver him from Assyria, and likewise received the prophet's condemnation, just as his evil father before him. Hezekiah's big failure was not only his pride but also his trust in the Babylonians to deliver him from the Assyrian threat.

Three Voices of Consolation**Introduction**

Hezekiah should have placed his trust in the LORD, as he was the one who would deliver him. Although Hezekiah was a godly king, he failed miserably in this regard. We may miss this, but in his political manoeuvring, Hezekiah acted just like his evil predecessor Ahaz, who trusted in Assyria (2 Kings 16:7-8), rather than the assurance of God's word through Isaiah that he would protect the kingdom (Isaiah 7:4).

The increasing rebellion and wickedness of the kings and people of Judah would eventually lead to their exile in Babylon. Whether they were as evil as Ahaz, or as godly as Hezekiah, they failed in this one area of trust.

Against this prophecy of the future exile and humiliation, the LORD brings a message of comfort and consolation (40:1-2). The time will come in future when the LORD will comfort his people once again. This consolation will be enough to fulfil all God's promises of restoration.

The LORD provides this message of consolation through three voices that announce the following:

The Glory of the LORD	40:3-5
The Word of the LORD	40:6-8
The Arm of the LORD	40:9-11

The End of the Exile

Many years later, Daniel, as an exile in Babylon, received the following answer regarding the end of the exile. The physical exile would end after 70 years, as Jeremiah had prophesied. However, the greatest exile of the Jews was spiritual, not physical. Not in an earthly city called Babylon, but in a spiritual city by the same name, the city of rebellion. Their enslavement was not to a human master, but slavery to sin and death. Their spiritual exile and slavery would last 70 times 7 years (Daniel 9:24-26).

Three Voices

The promise of comfort or consolation from their exile and slavery to sin has truly ended, and came to Israel by means of three voices. How would they know that the exile has ended?

The First Voice

The Word of God / The Promises of YAHWEH

YAHWEH, the Incomparable One**Introduction**

How do believers handle adverse circumstances? At the time of this prophecy, Israel (the Northern Kingdom) and Judah (the Southern Kingdom) were living under the Assyrian scourge. Israel had been invaded since 740 BC by successive Assyrian rulers, who finally conquered the Northern Kingdom and deported many Israelites in 722 BC. The Assyrian armies went on and destroyed all of Judah and came right up to the walls of Jerusalem (701 BC).

Those were difficult days, and God seemed far away. Isaiah prophesied the word of the LORD to the Southern kingdom, made up of Judah and Benjamin.

Isaiah 1:6 From the sole of your foot to the top of your head there is no soundness-- only wounds and welts and open sores, not cleansed or bandaged or soothed with oil. ⁷ Your country is desolate, your cities burned with fire; your fields are being stripped by foreigners right before you, laid waste as when overthrown by strangers. ⁸ The Daughter of Zion is left like a shelter in a vineyard, like a hut in a field of melons, like a city under siege.

How do we, as Christian believers, handle the similar pressures of life today? And is there something we as believers need to understand?

People in general trust in what their own hands have made. However, as believers, do we trust in the God of Scripture, or do we turn to idols? Before you say, "Yes, I do trust in God, and no, I will not turn to idols", consider the following:

God, His People and the Nations**Introduction**

The people of Israel would face a desperate situation with the future Babylonian invasion and subsequent exile. Under Nebuchadnezzar, two deportations took place in 605 and 597 BC. After a one-and-a-half-year siege of Jerusalem (2 Kings 25:1-3) starting in 588 BC, the Babylonians would break through the walls and destroy the city and the temple in 586 BC.

Still, the LORD was able to save them from all of their troubles. Just as the LORD saved them from the Assyrians, he was able to save them from the coming Babylonian threat as well.

However, there is a problem. Their sins and iniquities separate them from God. There is no one righteous or just. They are quick to rush into wickedness and invent new ways of doing evil.

The Non-Predicated *I am He* Sayings

In grammar, an object is used to describe or give meaning to a subject, separated by a verb. For example, a man would need to describe himself by adding an object, saying: "I am an engineer, a father, a soccer player, etc." On the other hand, YAHWEH alone does not need an object to describe himself. He simply states, "I am He." He is the eternal, self-existing One. The first such non-predicated self-declaration is found in Deuteronomy 32:39.

"See now that **I myself am He!** There is no god besides me.

Literally translated: I am, I am He, in Hebrew, ani ani hu (אֲנִי אֲנִי הוּא).

There are seven non-predicated 'I am He' statements in the book of the Servant. The first one is found in Isaiah 41:4

I am He, in Hebrew, ani hu (אֲנִי־הוּא).

The 'I am He' Statements

Isaiah 41:4 Who has done this and carried it through, calling forth the generations from the beginning? I, the LORD--with the first of them and with the last--**I am he.**"

The Plight of the Nations**Introduction**

In Isaiah 40:12-31, we noted what YAHWEH was like, compared to the idols of the nations. The command for the people of Israel was to trust in the LORD for salvation. But how about the rest of the world? In whom will they place their trust? How will they be saved?

The answer is given in Isaiah 41:21-29 and 42:1-9

In the near future, a great conqueror would arise from the East, from the land of Persia. He would conquer the known world. Not only would he destroy the Babylonians, but he also would tread down many other nations, and no one would be able to stand up to him.

What could the idols in whom the nations put their trust really do? If they could not even tell the future, how would they be able to save the nations? Let us see how YAHWEH describes the idols and how they are exposed.

What follows is a court scene where the idols are put on trial before the LORD, and their ability is compared to that of YAHWEH's own deliverer, whom he will send, called the Servant of the LORD. The word 'see' or 'behold' is used to highlight the ability of the idols, and then compare them to the ability of the LORD's Deliverer or Servant.

YAHWEH describes the idols in the following manner:

The LORD's Servant*Servant Song 1***Introduction**

Does YAHWEH have an answer to the world's problems? The LORD announced that in the near future, a great conqueror would rise from the East, from the land of Persia. Not only would he destroy the Babylonians, but other nations would not be able to stand before him, and he would establish a world empire.

When the nations hear about this conqueror, they will react in fear and consult their idols. But what can the idols really do? If they could not even foretell the coming of this conqueror, how will they be able to save the nations?

If idols cannot help, will the LORD provide an answer to the world's problems? What would be the LORD's answer? Someone he calls his Servant! The LORD will raise up someone called his Servant and commission him to bring deliverance to the world. The answer is given in 42:1-9.

The LORD contrasts the idols with his own deliverer, the Servant. The word 'see' or 'behold', or *hen in Hebrew* (הִנֵּה), is used to bracket the ability of the idols, as well as the Servant. YAHWEH describes the work and ability of the Servant, in contrast to the idols. This word is omitted in 41:24 and 42:1 of the NIV, but is clear to see in the NAS.

The Song of Praise**Introduction**

The nations of the world will realise the uselessness of their idols, and they will love the Servant's instruction (42:4). The uselessness of idols has already been exposed in 41:21-29, when the word 'see' or 'behold' shows them up for what they are:

The peoples of the world will realise the LORD's answer for their deliverance is the Servant, whose ability to deliver is described in 42:1-4, once again bracketed by the word 'see' or 'behold'.

Redemption from Earthly Captivity**Introduction**

The Servant of the LORD is the only one who will deliver the captives from spiritual exile. The LORD will hold his hand. The Spirit will accompany him, and he will bring forth justice, establish his teaching, open blind eyes and set the captives free.

However, in contrast to the Servant of the LORD (42:1-9), there is another servant. A servant of the LORD who has failed in his task. The deaf and blind servant: the people of Israel. This is the servant who will end up in the Babylonian exile. It will be necessary to set them free from physical exile. The one who will be able to set them free from their earthly captivity will be the deliverer from the east.

The deliverer is named in Isaiah 44:28 and Isaiah 45:1 and 45:13 as Cyrus. We know from history that he conquered Babylon in 539 BC. A year later, he allowed the Jews to return home and permitted them to rebuild the Temple.

The Certainty of Redemption**Introduction**

When a person finds themselves in a situation where no one can rescue them, because of circumstances caused by themselves or through God's judgement, what is the only solution?

The LORD needs to rescue them. The LORD alone can rescue, and he is willing. The whole tone of this passage is, "Do not fear." He will save a remnant of the people. The remnant does not mean the nation as a whole, but only those who trust in the LORD.

Not all of Israel will be saved. Only true Israel, but only a remnant. (Afrikaans: *oorblyfse!*). The prophetic name of Isaiah's son Shear-Jasub (Isaiah 7:3), which means 'a remnant will return', bears this out.

“I Am the LORD”**Introduction**

YAHWEH is the covenant Name of God. It describes the covenant relationship between God and Israel:

Exodus 6:2 God also said to Moses, "I am the LORD. ³ I appeared to Abraham, to Isaac and to Jacob as God Almighty, but by my name the LORD, did I not make myself known to them.

The LORD promised:

Exodus 6:7 I will take you as my own people, and I will be your God. Then you will know that I am the LORD your God, who brought you out from under the yoke of the Egyptians.

In Isaiah 43:14-15, the LORD calls himself:

- the Holy One of Israel
- your Holy One

When the LORD describes Himself as ‘the Holy One of Israel’ and ‘your Holy One’, he describes the **exclusive relationship** he has with His people. He also describes his attributes of purity, sinlessness, and moral perfection. As a bridegroom chooses a bride, God chose Israel as His bride.

Deuteronomy 7:6 For you are a people holy to the LORD your God. The LORD your God has chosen you out of all the peoples on the face of the earth to be his people, his treasured possession. ⁷ The LORD did not set his affection on you and choose you because you were more numerous than other peoples, for you were the fewest of all peoples.

However, Judah will end up in exile in Babylon. Babylon is not only a literal place, from which physical liberation will be necessary. Babylon is also a place of rebellion and moral impurity, which is why they would end up there in the first place, because their problem was that physical liberation alone can never solve the problem of sin. How can she belong to the LORD who is ‘the Holy One’, if she is unclean?

Redemption from Spiritual Captivity**Introduction**

The people of Israel and Judah were spiritually dead. They did not call on YAHWEH. Six times they were accused of not honouring the LORD (43:22-24). Six times we read, 'You have not', 'nor', 'or'. On the contrary, they were accused of burdening the LORD with their sins and wearying him with their offences (43:24).

Outwardly, they did all the right things. In their religious activity, they thought that they were sound. They kept lots of religious observances. But their prayer, ritual and sacrifice did not reach the LORD. But it was as if they never did.

Why was their worship deficient? Worship is not about me, but about God. Notice God referring to himself as 'me' eight times. True religion should not satisfy people, but God alone! The question is, is the LORD satisfied with what you offer him?

The sacrificial system was not intended to burden or weary them, but that God would provide a way to freedom. It demonstrated that they could never obey God as demanded. It pointed to grace, freedom and liberty. Yet, they missed it.

At heart, they rejected God. They gave him no proper sacrifice. Their sacrifices were mechanical, magical, and burdensome. We cannot manipulate God with our religion. They burdened God in the same way as described by Malachi 1:6-11, after the exile.

Holiness may be too costly for you. Human beings naturally opt for outward religious fervour and ritual. To the human mind, it is much more appealing and less demanding. But it will never please God! "Burnt offerings you brought, but not to me!"

Notice the words of Jesus:

Mark 7: 6-7 "Isaiah was right when he prophesied about you hypocrites; as it is written: "'These people honour me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me. They worship me in vain; their teachings are but rules taught by men.'"

The Spirit of the LORD**Introduction**

The LORD promises to pour out water on the thirsty land, streams on the dry ground. This is not natural water, but a metaphor for the Holy Spirit. We have already seen a glimpse of this in Isaiah 35 and 41.

Isaiah 35:6 Water will gush forth in the wilderness and streams in the desert. ⁷ The burning sand will become a pool, the thirsty ground bubbling springs. In the haunts where jackals once lay, grass and reeds and papyrus will grow.

Isaiah 41:18 I will turn the desert into pools of water, and the parched ground into springs.

Once again, we find the promise of the LORD.

Isaiah 44:3 For I will pour water on the thirsty land, and streams on the dry ground; **I will pour out my Spirit** on your offspring, and my blessing on your descendants.

This is what Jesus alluded to at the Feast of Tabernacles.

John 7:37 On the last and greatest day of the Feast, Jesus stood and said in a loud voice, "If anyone is thirsty, let him come to me and drink. ³⁸ Whoever believes in me, as the Scripture has said, streams of living water will flow from within him." ³⁹ By this he meant the Spirit, whom those who believed in him were later to receive. Up to that time the Spirit had not been given, since Jesus had not yet been glorified.

This is also what he promised the Samaritan woman of Sychar.

John 4:13 "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, ¹⁴ but whoever drinks the water I give him will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life".

Idols and Their Power**Introduction**

We have already been introduced to the idols several times in the book of the Servant (Isaiah 40:18-20; 41:7, 21-29). While God gives us movement and fills us with life, the idol is designed not to move, not even to fall! They are nailed down so that they do not topple over (41:7).

Our gods are as good as we can make them! Can you see the irony? How do the idols compare with God? God made everything. He is the Creator, but man makes the idols. Then he worships them as if they are God.

What are idols like in comparison to YAHWEH? When we looked at Isaiah 40:12-31, we noted what YAHWEH was like, compared to the idols of the nations. The command to trust in the LORD for salvation was the message for the people of Israel. But what about the rest of the world? How will they be saved?

The answer is given in Isaiah 41:21-29 and 42:1-9. In the near future, a great conqueror would rise from the East, from the land of Persia, who would conquer the known world. Not only would he destroy the Babylonians, but other nations would not be able to stand up to him.

But what can the idols that the nations put their trust in really do? They cannot explain the past, nor can they foretell the future; how will they be able to save the nations? No one can explain the past or foretell the future, but the LORD alone.

Who then is like me? Let him proclaim it. Let him declare and lay out before me what has happened since I established my ancient people, and what is yet to come-- yes, let him foretell what will come (Isaiah 44:7).

Disordered Love: People naturally look to created things—like money, success, approval, or relationships—for ultimate security and worth.

Good Things Distorted: Even normal, good aspects of life become idols when they take the supreme place meant for God

Cyrus: Builder and Conqueror**Introduction**

The people of Judah would go into exile because of their sin and rebellion. Those who placed their trust in the idols and gods of the nations would realise how futile it was. They would suffer at the violent hands of Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon.

The Babylonian invasion, siege and exile under Nebuchadnezzar would come in three waves.

The First Deportation in 605 BC.
During the reign of Jehoiakim (609–598 BC).

The Second Deportation in 597 BC.
During the reign of Jehoiachin (598–597 BC).

The Fall of Jerusalem and destruction of the Temple in 586 BC.
During the reign of Zedekiah (597–586 BC).

However, after approximately seventy years, as prophesied by Jeremiah (Jeremiah 25:11-12), the LORD would raise up a deliverer to rescue his people from Babylon and to mete out judgement against the Babylonians.

This would take place with the Fall of Babylon in 539 BC. The Neo-Babylonian Empire would exist and flourish only for as long as needed to purify the people of Judah.

No Other Saviour**Introduction**

This passage was written between 722 BC and 700 BC during the time of King Hezekiah. King Hezekiah was the prominent and faithful king of Judah who enacted major religious reforms, destroying pagan altars and restoring temple worship.

Hezekiah began to reign in Judah around 729 B.C. as co-regent with his father Ahaz (736–716 BC) at the age of twenty-five. After that, he reigned as sole regent for another twenty-nine years (c. 716–687 BC).

During this time, he revolted against Assyrian control, trusted in God, and successfully defended Jerusalem from Sennacherib, while also expanding his territory and prospering during his 29-year reign.

Less than 100 years after his reign ended, Israel would go into exile to Babylon in two deportations in 605 BC and 597 BC. In 586 BC, Jerusalem would fall, and the temple would be destroyed. The Jews would remain in Babylon for almost 70 years until released by Cyrus the Medo-Persian around 539 BC.

In Babylon, they would live under the power of the Kings of Babylon. The Babylonian gods, e.g. Bel and Nebo, would seem to be supreme. This passage describes Israel's situation in exile.

World history still seems the same today. Great forces seem to be unleashed across the globe. The super-rich, advanced technology, hostile political powers and a corrupt church. What can we learn from this passage in Isaiah?

I Will Carry You**Introduction**

Idols must have been a great scourge in Israel, as here we meet the idols again. We have already encountered the problem of idolatry in Isaiah 40:18-20; Isaiah 41:7, 21-29 and Isaiah 44:9-23. This time they are called by name, but in real life, they are many and varied.

In Babylon they would meet idol-worship in a new and virulent form. The Babylonian kings were supposedly incarnations of the gods Bel (father) and Nebo (son) with names such as:

Bel-Shassar

Nabu-Polassar

Nabu-Chadnezzar

Nabu-Nidus.

Note: the Satanic counterfeit of the God the Father and God the Son.

Even Daniel and his three friends would be renamed after the gods of Babylon:

- Daniel (God is my Judge) was renamed Belteshazzar (Keeper of the treasures of Bel or Baal).
- Hananiah (Yah (YAHWEH) has been gracious) was renamed Shadrach (after Aku the moon god).
- Mishael (Who is what God is?) was renamed Meshach (Who is what Aku is?).
- Azariah (Yah (YAHWEH) has helped) was renamed Abed-Nego (Servant of Nabu or Nebo, son of Bel).

In this passage, the futility of serving and worshipping idols is once again highlighted and contrasted with the ability of the LORD to do the very things expected of idols.

The Fall of Babylon**Introduction**

The people of Judah would go into exile for almost 70 years. The exile would start in 605 BC, and there would be another deportation in 597 BC. The city of Jerusalem would be sacked and the temple destroyed in 586 BC. However, in 539 BC, Cyrus the Great would conquer Babylon and give the Jews permission to return home.

Thus, the Neo-Babylonian kingdom would last for as long as the Jews needed to be in exile to fulfil the 70-year prediction of Jeremiah. From 605 to 539 BC was 67 years.

The spiritual exile would therefore last 70 years, rounded to the nearest multiple of ten. However, the spiritual exile of the Jews would last 7 times 70 years, as prophesied in Daniel 9:24-27

Introduction

In this section, the LORD addresses the visible covenant community, those called by the name of Israel, who come from the line of Judah. They take oaths in the name of the LORD, and they invoke the God of Israel.

They claim to be inhabitants of the holy city and claim to rely on the God of Israel, the LORD of Hosts. However, the LORD addresses them as Jacob. The name Jacob refers to the deceiver, before his name was changed to Israel. When the prophets speak of the people of Israel as wicked, they call them Jacob, the deceiver.

Ya'aqob (יַעֲקֹב) **meaning** Jacob 'heel holder' or 'supplanter'.

Isaiah 48:1 "Listen to this, O house of Jacob, you who are **called by the name of Israel** and come from the line of Judah...

When the LORD's prophets speak positively regarding the people of Israel, they often call them Jeshurun, or the upright one (Deuteronomy 33:5, 26; Isaiah 44:2).

Yeshurun (יֵשׁוּרֻן) **meaning** 'upright one'. Jeshurun is a symbolic name for Israel describing her ideal character.

"Listen to this, O house of Jacob, you who are called by the name of Israel and come from the line of Judah, you who take oaths in the name of the LORD and invoke the God of Israel-- **but not in truth or righteousness** -- you who call yourselves citizens of the holy city and rely on the God of Israel -- the LORD Almighty (of hosts) is his name...(Isaiah 48:1-2).

However, despite all of these assumptions, they are not all the actual people of God, as they are not calling to the LORD in truth and righteousness, and they are stubborn and rebellious. They are clearly not believers.

The LORD who Speaks!**Introduction**

We often hear the objection: 'We cannot hear God.' 'I do not know where God is.' 'I do not know if he is there.' 'I cannot see God'. 'I certainly do not understand God.' The problem is not that God does not speak. The LORD speaks, but the problem is that people's ears are closed, their eyes are blind, and their hearts are hard. This is the exact same problem Isaiah faced when he was called and commissioned. It is uncanny how our situation matches Isaiah's experience.

Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I. Send me!" He said, "Go and tell this people: "'Be ever hearing, but never understanding; be ever seeing, but never perceiving.' Make the heart of this people calloused; make their ears dull and close their eyes. Otherwise they might see with their eyes, hear with their ears, understand with their hearts, and turn and be healed" (Isaiah 6:8-10).

These people, i.e. the people of Judah, would not hear. The problem for Isaiah was, how long did he have to continue his preaching?

Then I said, "For how long, O Lord?" And he answered: "Until the cities lie ruined and without inhabitant, until the houses are left deserted and the fields ruined and ravaged, until the LORD has sent everyone far away and the land is utterly forsaken (Isaiah 6:11-12).

Until the land lay in ruins. Isaiah started in 740 BC with king Uzziah's death. Four kings later, in 701 BC, with the Assyrian invasion and siege of Jerusalem, Isaiah was still at it. Around him, the land lay in ruins. Yet the people would not listen. The LORD's commission: Don't stop until everything is destroyed and everyone is in exile. This would continue until 605 BC, a hundred years later, when the Babylonians invaded the land and took the people of Judah into exile. Through the prophet Isaiah, the LORD is addressing the hard-of-hearing covenant community and repeats his command to 'Listen!' in 48:1, in 48:12, 14 and 16.

The LORD does speak indeed and he does so in three important ways.

The LORD is in control of creation, and creation speaks.

But the LORD speaks in a third, even greater and clearer manner.

The LORD speaks in Person.

Divine Confirmation: Worldwide Success**Introduction**

What is the confirmation that the Servant's mission is a success? Many would stream into Zion because of the Servant's message.

The fulfilment of prophecy is the proof. If nobody or very few come, then it is a clear indication that this prophecy is false.

Nation and Servant, a Contrast*Servant Song 3***Introduction**

We heard that God has spoken in the past. He will speak again through his Servant. The Servant speaks of freedom, and his word sets the captives free.

The thing that is not clear at the moment is whether the Servant only have a message that would set the captives free. However, what action will the Servant undertake? As those who hold others in captivity will not simply let them go. What is the liberating and redeeming work the Servant will accomplish?

Will the people of Israel accept the Servant's message? We read in the previous section that the Servant's message will bring back some, but not all. As Isaiah's son's name, Shear-Jashub, indicates (7:3), only a remnant will return.

Isaiah 10:21 A remnant will return, a remnant of Jacob will return to the Mighty God. ²² Though your people, O Israel, be like the sand by the sea, only a remnant will return

Isaiah 49:6 he says: "It is too small a thing for you to be my servant to restore the tribes of Jacob and **bring back those of Israel I have kept.**

In this section, Isaiah 50:1 – 51:16, the answer to these questions will become a bit clearer.

We find four servant songs in the book of the Servant (Isaiah 38-55). In this section, we find the third servant song that will begin to explain the Servant's work of redemption.

The LORD who Comforts Zion**Introduction****Zion - The People of God**

Who or what is Zion? Zion is the ideal of Jerusalem, a city of righteousness (1:26-27). Sometimes Israel is called the daughter of Zion (1:8, 10:32, 16:1, 37:2, 52:2, 62:11).

For example:

Isaiah 1:8 The Daughter of Zion is left like a shelter in a vineyard, like a hut in a field of melons, like a city under siege.

The ideal of Zion is a city of righteousness, containing a people who worship the LORD in truth and holiness (Isaiah 2:2-3; 4:3, 52:1; 60:14). Zion is an ideal which Israel has not attained.

Isaiah 52:1 Awake, awake, O Zion, clothe yourself with strength. Put on your garments of splendour, O Jerusalem, the holy city.

Only those who are holy will be able to enter into Zion.

Isaiah 35:8 And a highway will be there; it will be called the Way of Holiness. The unclean will not journey on it; it will be for those who walk in that Way; wicked fools will not go about on it.⁹ No lion will be there, nor will any ferocious beast get up on it; they will not be found there. But only the redeemed will walk there,¹⁰ and the ransomed of the LORD will return. They will enter Zion with singing; everlasting joy will crown their heads. Gladness and joy will overtake them, and sorrow and sighing will flee away.

The words listen (33), hear (35) and look (37) all appear in the book of the Servant more than 30 times. Blind (13) times and deaf (5) times. The people of God or Zion are those who are able to listen, hear and look.

The Non-Predicated '*I am He*' Sayings

There are seven non-predicated 'I am He' statements in the Book of the Servant. YAHWEH alone does not need to describe himself by using an object. He is the eternal, self-existing One. Isaiah 51:12 is the last of these non-predicated 'I am He' statements.

The non-predicated '*I am He*' statements

1. Isaiah 41:4 Who has done this and carried it through, calling forth the generations from the beginning? I, the LORD--with **the first of them and with the last--I am he.**"

Redeeming Zion by Substitution*Servant Song 4***Introduction**

Note the following concepts from the Old Exodus:

Bondage: The firstborn Son of God, namely Israel, was in bondage in Egypt.

Exodus 4:22 Then say to Pharaoh, 'This is what the LORD says: **Israel is my firstborn son**,²³ and I told you, "Let my son go, so he may worship me." But you refused to let him go; so **I will kill your firstborn son.**"

Plagues: God's wrath was unleashed against Egypt. This was demonstrated by the ten plagues. We repeatedly hear the words affliction, smite and strike.

Death of the Firstborn: The final plague was the death of the 1st born.

Substitution: The Israelites could protect themselves by the blood of the Passover lamb.

The Exodus: The Israelites were led out by the Arm of the LORD.

Exodus 6:6 "Therefore, say to the Israelites: **'I am the LORD**, and I will bring you out from under the yoke of the Egyptians. I will free you from being slaves to them, and **I will redeem you with an outstretched arm** and with mighty acts of judgment.

Sinai: Covenant agreement, ratification by blood.

Exodus 24:7 Then he took the Book of the Covenant and read it to the people. They responded, "We will do everything the LORD has said; we will obey."⁸ Moses then took the blood, sprinkled it on the people and said, "This is the blood of the covenant that the LORD has made with you in accordance with all these words."

Curses: In Deuteronomy 32:1-43 we find the Song of the LORD, taught by Moses, containing both warnings and curses. The curses are expanded in Deuteronomy 28:15-68.

Now, the people of Israel are in bondage again in Babylon. Physically they would be delivered by Cyrus, but spiritually many were citizens of Babylon. For this spiritual bondage, a New Exodus was needed.

Isaiah 52:11 Depart, depart, go out from there! Touch no unclean thing! Come out from it and be pure, you who carry the vessels of the LORD.

Note: The coronation of a great King or Emperor of a world empire? Many will be appalled when they observe his exaltation! Now, if this is the exaltation of the LORD, displaying his holy arm through whom he is going to save, then humanly speaking, something must be very wrong here. This would be a different kind of exaltation. Therefore, many will be appalled.

Rejection: His exaltation and lifting up involved disfigurement and marring. Beyond human likeness, the end result, unlike any human recognition, he would be **an object of horror**.

His face - his appearance was so disfigured beyond that of any man

Marred: *mishchath* (מִשְׁחָת) meaning *disfigurement* (of face)

His face will be disfigured beyond recognition.

His form - his form marred beyond human likeness, i.e. his body would be grotesquely mangled. His human form, i.e. his body, will be so broken that he will not be recognisable as being human. How could anyone possibly believe that this mangled human form, this disfigured face, that this is the Arm of the LORD? The one through whom the LORD will send to save his people? However, there is another reality. Just as many were appalled, so he will sprinkle many nations.

Note: A covenant is ratified by blood. The Servant would somehow do what Moses did, who sprinkled the people of Israel with the blood of the Covenant.

However, the Servant would sprinkle:

- Not just the people of Israel, but many nations.
- Not with the blood of a bull or a goat, but with his own blood.
- Not for the ratification of the Old Covenant, but by instating a new covenant.

The Hope of Justification and Resurrection*Servant Song 4***Introduction**

In Isaiah 52:7, we heard the glad tidings, the **good news** of **salvation** and **peace**.

Isaiah 52:7 How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring **good news**, who proclaim **peace**, who bring **good tidings**, who proclaim **salvation**, who say to Zion, "Your God reigns!"

The Good news was that the LORD would once again display his saving power by laying bare his holy arm in the sight of all the nations.

Isaiah 52:10 The LORD will lay bare his **holy arm** in the sight of all the nations, and all the ends of the earth will see **the salvation of our God**.

The Arm of the Lord, or the saving power of God, was someone called the Servant of the LORD (YAHWEH).

Isaiah 52:13 See, my servant will act wisely / have success; he will be raised and lifted up and highly exalted.

The good news of salvation for the people of Zion is that the Servant saved us by the penal substitution of himself.

Isaiah 53:5 But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed.

Let us look at the suffering, death and resurrection of the Servant of the Lord. I.e. what did the Servant of the LORD accomplish?

It will be rebuilt with streets and a trench, but in times of trouble. ²⁶ After the sixty-two 'sevens', **the Anointed One** will be **cut off** and will have nothing.

Compare that with Isaiah 53:8 For he was **cut off** from the land of the living; **for the transgression of my people he was stricken.**

The Glory of Zion**Introduction**

3500 years ago, the king of Egypt prevented Israel from worshipping God. On the 14th day of the first month, at midnight, the LORD struck down the 1st born of Egypt (Exodus 12:29). In the light of the full moon, Israel left Egypt (Exodus 12:31-33). The Exodus from Egypt took place, but spiritually, Egypt was in them!

The New Covenant in Christ's Blood

2000 years ago, the night before Passover, in the light of the full moon, none other than the Servant of YAHWEH prepared for a New Exodus in the Garden of Gethsemane. At 12 noon on the 14th of Nisan, 29 AD, he died.

Regarding the Servant of YAHWEH, it must be noted:

Hebrews 9:12 He did not enter by means of the blood of goats and calves; but he entered the Most Holy Place once for all **by his own blood**, having obtained eternal redemption.

His life became an atonement sacrifice, as in the Day of the Atonement, for the many of his people. He became the scapegoat, the sin-bearer. As a substitutionary sacrifice for the sins of many.

Mark 10:45 For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.

Afflicted not only by men, but also by God – for us. Cut off or struck from the land of the living – on our behalf. The death of the 1st born, the unique Son of God.

There are those who are appalled at him and who do not accept Him. In this mangled body, they cannot recognise Jesus as the Saviour of God (52:14).

However, some will see and understand that his life is an atonement for many (52:15; 53:11).

The Great Banquet**Introduction**

The Servant was afflicted not only by men, but also by God – for us. Cut off or struck from the land of the living – on our behalf. The death of the 1st born, the unique Son of God. Our guilt was placed on him. He faced God's wrath in our place. The sacrificial lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. If his death was the punishment for our sin, how would we know if it has been accomplished? If it all ended with the Servant's death on that day, would we have any hope? How would we know if the offer of his life was accepted and sufficient for what it was intended for? Did the servant accomplish his mission?

Work of the LORD's Servant

Just as Passover led to the Old Exodus, the Old Covenant (Sinai) and Promised Land and freedom, just so the Cross leads to a New Exodus, the New Covenant (Golgotha), the Kingdom of God and a new life

The ultimate reality of the cross: The fullness of the KOG. This would lead to God's people truly worshipping God in God's way and in a perfectly renewed world!

The Book of the Servant

When we consider the book of the Servant, we discern the following: The book starts with King Hezekiah's health scare and the Assyrian invasion outside the walls of Jerusalem. Hezekiah's faith is tested and proven, and the LORD delivers him and his people from both threats. However, Hezekiah fails the subsequent temptation of the Babylonian delegation. Because of his failure, as well as the rebellion and idolatry of subsequent kings, his people would go into exile, and even some of his own household would become eunuchs in the palace of the king of Babylon, the place whose name represents rebellion in the Bible.

However, as soon as this is made clear, a word of comfort is received from the LORD. The LORD is the creator and in control of world history and the affairs of men. His glory would be revealed to the people of Judah. The LORD would send a deliverer named King Cyrus to set them free from physical exile in Babylon. They would return to Jerusalem, and their physical exile would come to an end. There was, however, a greater problem than their physical exile, of which Babylon was symbolic. They were in spiritual bondage in a place called Babylon, and deliverance from this spiritual reality could only be achieved through a special agent of the LORD named the Servant of the LORD.

The Servant of the LORD would not only set the people of Israel free, but he would also be a deliverer to all the nations of the world. The nations and the coastlands would put their hopes in him. The people of Israel and the citizens of many nations would be set free from darkness and bondage and return to the ideal of Jerusalem, namely a place called Zion. Zion was a city where only the righteous and the holy could live, and it was not the same as the earthly Jerusalem. It was a city of righteousness and holiness.

The Servant was the one to bring this about, and he would accomplish it in two ways. The Servant would bring a message of good news and salvation and teach what the LORD would instruct him. Secondly, the Servant of the LORD would act as a deliverer through his work of redemption. He would be exalted, marred beyond human likeness, and he would be cut off from the land of the living. However, the punishment and affliction upon him would be because of the sins of his people. He would act as a penal substitution for the sins of the citizens of Zion.

He would take their sin and guilt upon himself, and this would be accepted by the LORD.

The Servant would bring about spiritual deliverance from a place called Babylon, and after his suffering and death, he would rise again and see his reward. The best of all the nations. Many would enter the city of Zion, and it would be filled with glory. Many from all nations would come and celebrate a great feast together with the Servant.

And so our understanding of many of the themes introduced at the beginning is formed:

1. Comfort for the LORD's people.
2. Good tidings or good news for Zion.
3. The command to: 'Listen, hear and look.'
4. The blind and deaf servant of the LORD, namely Israel.
5. The uniqueness of the LORD vs. idols.
6. The righteous Servant of the LORD described in four Servant songs.
 - The Servant would be a Covenant to the people and a light unto the Gentile nations
 - The Servant would set the peoples free by his teaching.
 - The Servant would be rejected by the people.
 - The Servant would be afflicted, cursed and killed, and he would rise again.
7. The Servant would be a penal substitution for many.
8. The 'I am He' statements, describing the uniqueness of YAHWEH.
9. Citizenship in Babylon.
10. Citizenship in Zion.

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The New Testament and the Servant of the LORD

What is the Servant's identity according to the writers of the New Testament?

All four of the gospel writers, **Matthew, Mark, Luke and John**, teach that Jesus fulfilled the prophecy of the Servant of Isaiah.

If we look at the **4th Servant Song: Isaiah 52:13- 53:12**

John says, for example:

John 12:37 Even after Jesus had done all these miraculous signs in their presence, they still would not believe in him. ³⁸ This was to fulfil the word of Isaiah the prophet: "Lord, who has believed our message and to whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed?"

Isaiah 53:1

Paul and Peter, the writer to the Hebrews, all teach that the servant of the LORD has been fulfilled in Jesus. For example...

Paul writes:

Romans 15:21 Rather, as it is written: "Those who were not told about him will see, and those who have not heard will understand."

Isaiah 52:15

Peter writes:

1 Peter 2:21 To this you were called, because Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example, that you should follow in his steps. ²² "He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth."

Isaiah 53:9

1 Peter 2:24 He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed.

Isaiah 53:5

1 Peter 2:25 For you were like sheep going astray, but now you have returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls.

Isaiah 53:6

The Writer to the Hebrews has this beautiful allusion to the 4th servant song:

Hebrews 12:24 to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to **the sprinkled blood** that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.

Alluding to **Isaiah 52:15**

If we add up all the verses in the 4th servant Song, **Isaiah 52:13-53:12**, found in the NT, we see that it is quoted **8 times** directly.

Isaiah 52:15; Isaiah 53:1, 4, 4-5, 7, 7-8, 9, 12

That is not including the many allusions to the 4th Servant Song.

Jesus himself clearly alludes to the Servant of the LORD in Isaiah, of which Mark 10:45 and John 8:28, referring to the 4th Servant Song, are most striking:

Mark 10:45 For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to **serve**, and to give **his life as a ransom for many**.

Alluding to **Isaiah 53:11**

Isaiah 53:11 After the suffering of his soul, he will see the light *of life* and be satisfied; by knowledge of him, my righteous servant will justify many, and he will bear their iniquities.

NKJ **John 8:28** Then Jesus said to them, "When you lift up the Son of Man, then you will know that I am *He* ...

John 12:32 But I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all men to myself."

Alluding to **Isaiah 52:13**

From these quotations and allusions, we are clear on who the NT writers thought fulfilled the prophecies of the Servant of the LORD in Isaiah.
